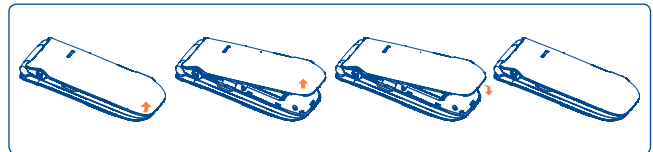
To prevent possible hearing damage, do not listen at high volume levels for long periods. Exercise caution when holding your device near your ear while the loudspeaker is in use.



# Getting Started.....

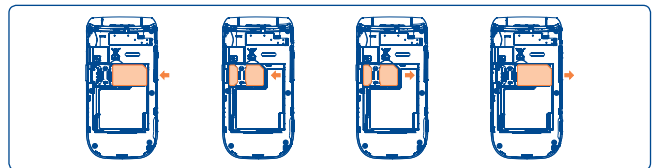
## 1.1 Set-Up

### Removing or installing the back cover



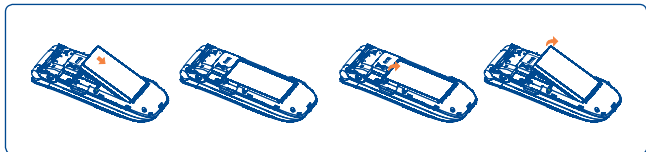
### Inserting or removing the SIM card

The SIM card and battery are normally pre-installed for you. Follow these instructions should you ever need to access them yourself. Please power off your phone and remove battery before inserting or removing the SIM card.



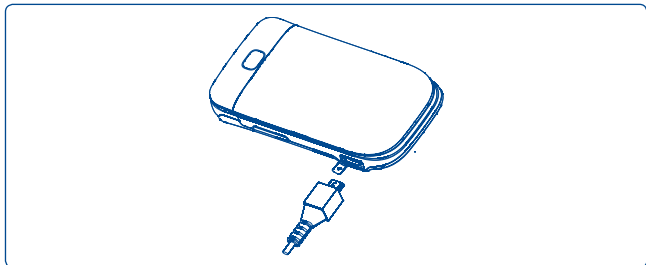
Place the SIM card with the chip facing downwards and slide it into its housing. Make sure that it is correctly inserted. To remove the card, press and slide it out.

## Installing or removing the battery




Insert and click the battery into place, then close the telephone cover. Unclip the cover, then remove the battery.

## Charging the battery



Connect the battery charger to your phone and outlet respectively.



- LED light will illuminate when it is charging, and turn off when battery is fully charged.
- Charging may take about 20 minutes to start if the battery is low.
- Be careful not to force the plug into the socket.
- Make sure the battery is correctly inserted before connecting the charger.
- The outlet must be near the phone and easily accessible (avoid electric extension cables).

- When using your telephone for the first time, charge the battery fully (approximately 3 hours). You are advised to fully charge the battery (  ) each time.



In order to reduce power consumption, you can do the following: disconnect the charger from the phone when the battery is fully charged, switch off Bluetooth<sup>®</sup>, exit out of any background running applications when not in use, reduce the back light time-out, etc.

## 1.2 Power on your cellphone

Hold down the  key until the cellphone powers on, type in your PIN code if necessary and then confirm with the  key. The Home Screen is displayed.

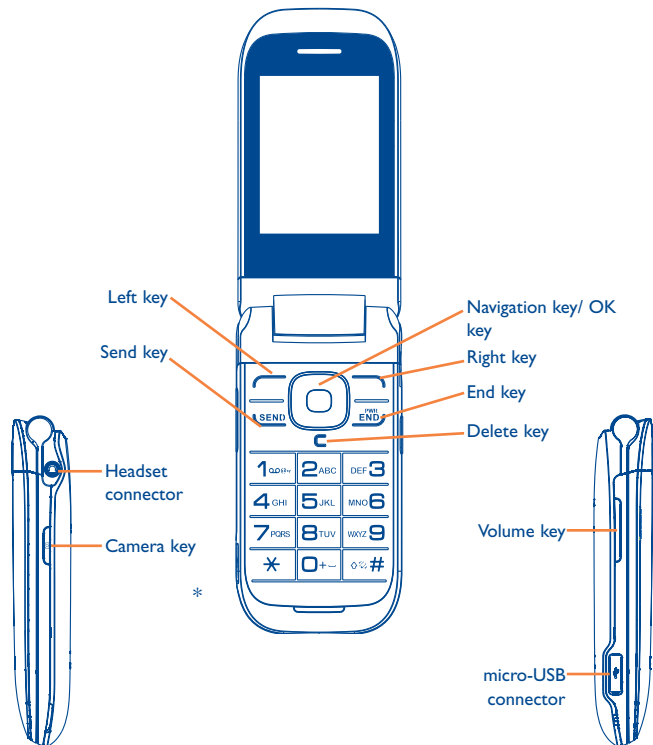
While the phone is searching for a network, "**Searching/Emergency**" will be displayed.

## 1.3 Power off your cellphone

Hold down the  key from the Home Screen.

# 2 Your Cellphone .....

## 2.1 Keys and Connectors



- Navigation key <sup>(1)</sup> Press to go left/right/up/down  
Press to access function  
UP: Call log  
DOWN: Contacts  
LEFT <sup>(2)</sup>: Tools  
RIGHT <sup>(2)</sup>: Media



- OK key: Press to confirm an option
- Answer/Send a call
- Enter Call log
- Long pressing the green Send button will launch the emergency dialer.



- Press: End a call  
Return to the Home Screen



- Press and hold: Power on/off
- Press: Delete characters in Edit mode



- Press: "#" key  
Press and hold: Switch between General profile and Vibration profile
- In Edit mode  
Press: Switch between ABC/Abc/abc  
Press and hold: Switch between Multi-Tap/Smart



- Press: "1" Key  
Press and hold: Access your voicemail
- In Edit mode  
Press: Input "I" (Input method in Number)  
Input frequently-used symbols (Other input method)  
Press and hold: Input "I"

<sup>(2)</sup> The ability to access the functions for the LEFT/RIGHT keys are only available when the shortcut bar is off.

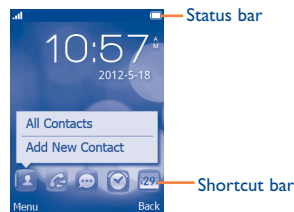

## 2.3 Home Screen


### 2.3.1 Shortcut bar



Shortcuts are Home Screen icons for your frequently used items, like Calls or Messages.




You can customize shortcut bar by selecting "**Settings\Phone settings\Shortcut bar**".

To display a shortcut, press the  key. To scroll through the shortcuts to select one, press the Navigation key right and left.

To add/remove a shortcut, select "**Edit shortcuts**" and use the  key to mark the shortcuts you need, and then confirm by pressing "**Save**".




To reorder shortcuts, select "**Reorder shortcuts**" and choose one item by pressing the  key, scroll up or down to the required position, and place it by pressing the  key.

-  You aren't allowed to add more than five shortcuts. Two shortcuts cannot be removed: Calls, Messages.




## 3 Making A Call .....

### 3.1 Placing a call


Dial the desired number then press the  key to place the call. The number you entered can be saved to Contacts by selecting "Save". If you make a mistake, you may press the  key to delete the incorrect digits one by one, or you may press and hold the  key to delete all at once.


To hang up the call, press the  key.

#### Making an emergency call



If your phone has network coverage, dial the emergency number and press the  key to make an emergency call. This works even without a SIM card and without typing the PIN code.



### 3.2 Calling your voicemail

Your voicemail is provided by your network to avoid missing calls. It works like an answering machine that you can consult at any time. To access your voicemail, hold down the  key.

If the  key does not access your voicemail, please call us at 888-345-5509 for further assistance.

### 3.3 Receiving a call



When you receive an incoming call, press the  key to talk and then hang up using the  key.

If the  icon is displayed, vibrate mode is active and there is no ringtone. If the  icon is displayed, the phone neither rings nor vibrates.



The caller's number is displayed if it is transmitted by the network (contact your service provider to check service availability).

#### If the cellphone is open

- To pick up a call, press the  key.
- To mute the ringtone of the current incoming call, press the Right softkey.
- To reject a call, press the  key or the Right softkey. To reject the call with SMS, press the Left softkey.

#### If the cellphone is closed

- To pick up a call, open the cellphone.
- To mute the ringtone of the current incoming call, press the Volume key.
- To reject a call, press and hold the Volume key.

### 3.4 During a call

#### During a call, following options are available:

- Mute (Turn the Mute function on/off during a call)
- Hold (Hold the current call)
- End (End the current call)
- New call (Hold the current call and dial another number)
- Contacts (Enter Contacts)
- Messaging (Enter Message)
- DTMF (Enable/Disable sending DTMF during the call)
- Calendar (Enter Calendar)

- Sound recorder (record your current call)

You can switch the audio speech from handset to Bluetooth® device when connected.

You can use the **Handsfree** function by pressing the Right softkey during a call.

You may also adjust the sound level by using the Navigation key directly during a call.





Move the handset away from your ear while using the "Handsfree" option because the amplified volume might cause hearing damage.

### Handling two calls

- Answering a second call (ensure that "Call waiting" is activated, see page 50).
- To call a second party during a call, you can select "**Options\New call**".

### 3.5 Conference calls

Your phone allows you to talk to several people at the same time (up to five). If you are on a double call, press "**Options**" and select "**Conference**". If a third call comes in, answer it by pressing the  key and speak with your new caller.

This caller becomes a member of the conference if you press "**Options**" and select "**Conference call**". Pressing  disconnects the current call.

## 4 Messaging .....



You can create, edit and receive SMS/MMS, with this cellphone.


MMS enables you to send video clips, pictures, photos, animations and sounds to other compatible devices.



The MMS function can only be used if the service is provided by your service provider, and if your contract includes the MMS option and if all the parameters for MMS have been entered (see page 21).

### 4.1 Access

You may access this menu using the following options:

- Access from the main menu by selecting "**Messaging**".
- Select  from shortcut bar, and then enter the sub-menu you want.

When you access "**Messaging**", you can switch between SMS/MMS by using the navigation key.



### 4.2 SMS/MMS

#### 4.2.1 Conversational On (Off) mode

Conversational view mode is set as default. You may switch to conventional mode by selecting "**Settings\Switch view mode**". In conversational on mode, you can view the chat history in chronological order. In conversational off mode, you may have access to the following folders: **Inbox**, **Drafts**, **Outbox**, **Sent**, **Emergency Alerts**, **Archive**, **Empty Folder**, **Voicemail**, **Broadcast SMS**, **Templates**, and **Settings**.

The following instructions are based on conversational mode.

## 4.2.2 Write message

You can select "**Messaging**\New message" from the main menu or access it from the shortcut  to write a text/multimedia message. One or more recipients can be added from your contact list and you can remove a recipient by pressing the Delete key. Press the  key and select "**More**" to select multiple recipients from Contacts.

An SMS (Short Messaging Service) will be converted to MMS automatically when pictures, videos, audio, slides or attachments are inserted; Subject, CC/BCC address is added; or the message contains more than 8 pages of text.

### Delay send

You can schedule a SMS/MMS to be sent out at predefined time by selecting ("**Options**\Delay send").



An SMS message of more than a certain number of characters (the number of characters depends on your language) will be charged as several SMS. An MMS message containing photos and/or sounds may also be billed as more than one message. Specific letters, such as an accent or special character, will increase the size of the SMS and may cause multiple SMS to be sent to your recipient.

## 4.2.3 Available options

### 4.2.3.2 Switch view mode

You can switch the message view mode between conversational on and off modes.

### 4.2.3.3 Voicemail

View and edit the voicemail number.

### 4.2.3.4 Settings

#### Text messages

##### Profile Settings

- Profiles can be retrieved directly from the SIM card.  
Alternatively, you can create your own profile.

##### Common settings

- Delivery report: request for acknowledgement of delivery report On/Off; Reply path: show reply path; Save sent messages: save all your sent messages.

##### Alphabet management

- Enables the definition of SMS data coding for management SMS sending.

##### Memory status

- Show memory used on the phone and SIM card.

##### Preferred storage

- Select default message storage: SIM or phone.

## Multimedia messages

**Data account** • Select your data account for multimedia messages.

## Common settings

**Edit** • Set slide timing, edit mode, picture size, signature, etc.

**Send** • Set the values for validity period, read report, etc.

**Retrieve** • Set the values for home network, roaming network, etc.

**Preferred storage** • Select default MMS storage, phone or memory card.

**Memory status** • Show memory used on the phone or microSD card.

## Service messages

**Enable push** • Enable/Disable to accept all or trusted push messages.

**Enable service loading** • Enable/Disable service loading.

**Enable white list** • Enable/Disable white list.

**Enable black list** • Enable/Disable black list.

**White list** • Edit the white list.

**Black list** • Edit the black list.

# 5 Contacts .....

## 5.1 Contacts

You can access this function by selecting "**Contacts**" from the main menu.

 Contacts stored in phone

 Contacts stored in SIM card



### Searching for a contact

You can search for a contact by inputting the first letter of their name. Subsequent letters may be added to refine the search.

### Viewing a contact

Select a name from your contacts to read the contact information.

### Making the call

Press the  key once the name is selected. If several numbers are associated with that name and none has been set as a default, first choose the required number from the list (mobile, home, work, etc.), and then press the  key to make the call.

## 5.2 Adding a contact

You can add a new contact to the phone or SIM card by selecting "**Add new contact**".

When you access your contacts for the first time you are required to import your contacts from the SIM card to your phone.

The following fields are accessible when you create a new contact: Name, Group, Picture, To SIM, To phone, Mobile, Home, Work, Birthday, URL, Address, Ringtone.

You can move from one field to another using the navigation key.



If you have an international number you would like to store in your Contacts, generally you must enter 011 + the country code + phone number.

**Note:** You are able to make international calls with your service. However, in addition to using minutes from your plan, there is also a per-minute international charge. ### 5.3 Available options

From the contact list, you can access the following options:

<b>Add new contact</b>	Add a contact (name, numbers, address, etc.) in the Contacts.
<b>Send message</b>	Send a SMS/MMS to a contact you selected from Contacts.
<b>View</b>	Display details of selected contact
<b>Call</b>	Make a call to the selected contact.
<b>Edit</b>	Modify the contents of a file: name, number, ringtone, picture, etc.
<b>Delete</b>	Delete the selected contact.
<b>Edit before call</b>	Edit the phone number before placing a call.
<b>Copy</b>	Copy the selected contact to phone, SIM card or File manager.
<b>Send vCard</b>	Exchange data via SMS, MMS, Bluetooth®.
<b>Groups</b>	You can view and/or send messages to a selected group. You can also create or delete groups.
<b>Move</b>	Move to phone or SIM card.

<b>Management</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• <b>My vCard</b> Type in or modify user's own name, number, and work.</li><li>• <b>Preferred storage</b> Select default message storage: SIM or phone.</li><li>• <b>Memory status</b> View used and available space in SIM card, Phone and Group contacts.</li><li>• <b>Emergency call</b> Make an Emergency call.</li><li>• <b>Copy several</b> Copy selected contacts to phone or SIM card.</li><li>• <b>Delete several</b> Delete selected contacts from SIM or phone.</li><li>• <b>Move several</b> Move selected contacts to phone or SIM card.</li><li>• <b>Display format</b> Select the display format of contacts.</li></ul>
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### 5.4 Import contacts from SIM




You can select your contact and press "**Options\Copy**" or "**Options\Move**" to your phone.

## 6 Call Log.....

### 6.1 Access

You can access the function using the following options:

- Select the  from main menu
- Press the  key from the Home Screen
- Select the  from the shortcut bar, and then enter the sub-menu you want.

-  Missed calls
-  Outgoing calls (Redial)
-  Answered calls/Rejected calls

### 6.2 Available options

When you press "Options", you can have access to **Send message, Call, Missed calls, Edit before call, Delete**, etc.

## 7 Media.....

### 7.1 Camera

Your cellphone is fitted with a camera for taking photos and shooting videos. You can access the camera by pressing the Camera key. Once the camera is open, you can use the same Camera key to take a picture. Once you take a picture, you can do the following:


- Store them in your "**File manager\Phone**" or "**File manager\microSD card**".
- Send them in a multimedia message (MMS) to a cellphone.
- Send them directly by MMS or Bluetooth®.
- Customize your Home Screen (see page 47).
- Select it as an incoming call picture to a contact in your Contacts.
- Transfer them by data cable or microSD card to your computer.

#### 7.1.1 Access

You can access this feature from the main menu by selecting "**Media\Camera**".

#### 7.1.2 Camera















##### 7.1.2.1 Take a photo, save or delete

The screen acts as the viewfinder. Position the object or landscape in the viewfinder and press  to take a photo. The picture will be automatically saved. If you don't want the picture, you may also delete it.

### 7.1.2.2 Settings in framing mode

Before taking the photo, you can adjust a number of settings. From the camera screen, press the Left softkey to select "**Options**" to access: "**Picture Size**", "**Capture mode**", "**Picture Quality**", "**Timer**", "**Night mode**", "**Banding**", "**EV**", "**White balance**", and "**Color mode**". You can also access the following options:

- Gallery** • Go to "**File manager\Phone**" or "**File manager\Memory card**" to view the photos you have taken.
- Storage** • You may choose microSD card as saving location if a card is inserted.
- Video** • Access video recording mode.
- Restore default** • Return all settings to default values.
- Shutter sound** • Select to turn on/off sound when taking a picture.

### 7.1.2.3 Options available after taking the photo

Once you have taken a photo, you can send your photo by Bluetooth®, MMS, assign it to a contact, set as wallpaper, or go to "**Gallery**" to view it.


### 7.1.3 Video recorder


You can record a video clip of unlimited length, as long as there is sufficient memory and battery life.

#### 7.1.3.1 Framing mode

When you enter the video function, you are in Framing mode. Use the cellular phone main screen as a viewfinder and press "**Options**" for the following settings: **Video quality**, **Night mode**, **Record size**, **Record audio**, **Color mode**, **EV**, **Encode format** and **Storage**, to **Camera** and "**Videos**".

#### 7.1.3.2 Recording mode

Once you have chosen your settings, you can launch the recording of your videoclip by pressing the  key.

 If you receive a call in recording mode, video recording will stop and the clip will be saved automatically.

#### 7.1.3.3 Further operations after shooting a video

After shooting a video, you can choose to send your video by MMS, Bluetooth® or go to "**Videos**" to view it.

In the list of "**Videos**", press "**Options**" to rename the video, send the video, etc.

## 7.2 Music player

You can access this feature from the main menu by selecting "**Media/ Music player**".

You will have full flexibility of managing music both on your cellphone and microSD card.


Access your music files through one of the following:

- All songs** Contains all songs both on the cellphone and microSD card.
- Favorites** You can simply add your favorite songs to "Favorites" by holding down \* during playback (max 100).
- Folders** Category of songs in folder.
- Album** Music files are categorized by Album,
- Artist** Music files are categorized by Artist.
- Genre** Music files are categorized by Genres. Those missing such information will be classified as "Other".

### 7.2.1 Update songs

Update the information of songs saved in phone or microSD card.

### 7.2.2 Music playing mode

To adjust the volume, use the navigation key.

### 7.2.3 Settings

Access by pressing the Left softkey for following options:

- Play mode** Enables you to switch among **Normal**, **Repeat**, **Repeat all**, **Shuffle** and **Repeat shuffle**.
- Equalizer** Show different music styles preset in the phone.
- Display** Enable your player to display song information and lyrics.



### 7.3 Picture viewer

The picture viewer shows photos from both the phone and microSD card. You can do the following: show in list, sent, set as wallpaper, and incoming call picture or sent by MMS, and Bluetooth®.

Select a picture once to view it in full screen.







### 7.4 Video player

Contains all video clips both in the phone and microSD card and enables you to play, send, delete, rename, sort, etc.

#### Streaming URL

This feature enables the user to start watching video as it begins downloading from Internet.

Useful icons/keys:

-  Set as play/pause/resume
-  Press the Navigation key (UP/DOWN) to set the volume level
-  Press the Navigation key: Previous/next video
-  Press and hold the Navigation key: Backward/forward
-  Back to previous menu or exit
-  Switch between normal screen and full screen display.


### 7.5 FM Radio

Your phone is equipped with a radio<sup>(1)</sup> with RDS<sup>(2)</sup> functionality. You can use the application as a traditional radio with saved channels or with parallel visual information related to the radio program on the display if you tune to stations that offer Visual Radio service. You can listen to it while running other applications.



To use this feature you must plug in your headset. The headset works as an antenna when connected to your phone.

#### Available options:

- Channel list** Open the list of saved stations.
- Save channel** Save the current tuned station to the "**Channel list**".
- Auto search** Start auto search and stations will be automatically saved to "**Channel list**".
- Manual search** Search channels manually.
- Enter frequency** Enter the frequency manually.
- Record** Record the radio: files will be automatically saved to "**Voice memo**".
- Settings** Use Navigation key to manage settings.
- Turn off** Stop playing the radio.
- Activate loudspeaker/ Play in headset** Listen to the radio using loudspeaker or headset.
- Play/Mute** Use  key to switch between play and mute.

<sup>(1)</sup> The quality of the radio depends on the coverage of the radio station in that particular area.

<sup>(2)</sup> Depending on your network operator and market.

## 7.6 Voice recorder

Access this feature from the main menu by selecting "**MediaVoice recorder**", allows you to make voice or sound recordings.

### Available options:

<b>Send</b>	Send by MMS or Bluetooth®.
<b>New record</b>	Add new voice memo.
<b>Rename</b>	Rename a recorded file.
<b>Delete</b>	Delete the selected voice/sound recording.
<b>Delete all</b>	Delete all recorded files.
<b>Select</b>	Select voice recordings to do further options.

## 8 Files .....



You will have access to all audio and visual files stored in phone or microSD card in File manager.

When a microSD card that contains content from a previous phone is inserted for the first time, it will be scanned and the default folders will be created. You can transfer photos from the microSD to your phone.

### 8.1 Phone

Access to all files and folders stored in phone.

#### 8.1.1 Audio

Choose an audio file for an incoming call ringtone, a message alert beep, etc.

The "**Audio**" album contains the following folders <sup>(1)</sup>:

- Music: full track music.
- Melodies: melodies that can be set as ringtone.
- Recorded: all recorded sounds.



DRM: Digital Rights Management feature allows sounds and pictures to be played while protecting the associated copyright. DRM counter-based files and files with expired rights will not be automatically played when scrolling through the list.

#### 8.1.2 Pictures



Pictures will be displayed in alphabetical order.

<sup>(1)</sup> The embedded folder names cannot be modified. However, in certain cases, you can modify, delete and add items included in these folders.

### 8.1.3 Videos

"Videos" album contains video clips recorded, received or downloaded.

### 8.1.4 Gallery

This feature stores all the photos captured by your cellphone.

### 8.1.5 Downloads

This feature stores all downloaded files.

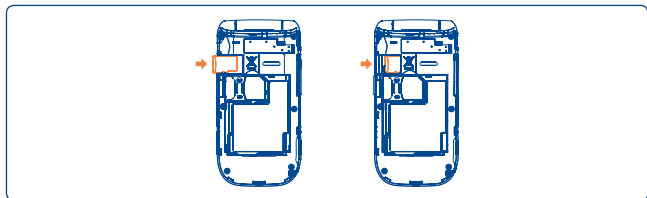
## 8.2 microSD card

You can access all files stored in the microSD card here.



When a microSD card is inserted for the first time, it will be scanned and the default folders will be created.

### Inserting the microSD card:



Insert the microSD card with the golden contacts facing downwards into the microSD slot until it is locked. To remove it, gently pull the memory card until it is unlocked.



The microSD card is an optional accessory that is sold separately.

### Available options:

<b>Create folder</b>	Create folders
<b>Empty folder</b>	Remove folder contents
<b>Rename</b>	Edit the folder name
<b>Open</b>	Open the folder
<b>Delete</b>	Delete the folder
<b>Sort</b>	Sort folders
<b>Details</b>	Displays folder details

## 8.3 Managing audios, pictures, videos and others

According to the item chosen, you can access some of the functions below:

<b>Send</b> <sup>(1)</sup>	Send the audio/pictures/video.
<b>Delete</b>	Delete the audio/pictures/video selected (not applicable for embedded items).
<b>Set as</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Picture→wallpaper, assign it to a contact.</li><li>• Sound→ringtone, message beep, assign it to a contact.</li></ul>
<b>Select</b>	Mark/Unmark a tick on a file for further operation. Press the left softkey.
<b>Download</b>	Download new items.

Customize your browser preferences.

# 10 Applications .....



From the main menu, select the menu icon  to access Applications.

## 10.1 WEB

**WEB** not only gives you the full Web experience to stay in touch with your friends, obtain information, do your online banking etc., but also saves time by using compressed web pages.

## 10.2 News

This application provides you with news updates from website channels you subscribe to.

Once subscribed to a channel, it gives you the ability to track and manage all your favorite RSS content on your cellphone at anytime, anywhere!

### Available options:

<b>Update</b>	Refreshes channel content.
<b>Create channel</b>	Create a new channel with name and URL.
<b>Delete</b>	Deletes channel.
<b>Edit</b>	Edit the name or URL of a channel.
<b>Update all</b>	Refresh all channels.
<b>Settings</b>	Select a regular interval to retrieve updates automatically, set to show pictures or not, as well as a WAP account to connect to.

**Enable/Disable auto-update** Activates or disables auto-update to specific channels.

**Enable/Disable all auto-update** Activates or disables auto-update to all channels.

**Send** Share a channel with your friend by sending it by SMS or MMS.

## 10.3 Weather

Your phone is equipped with a weather function for viewing up to 3-day forecasts of your favorite cities.

You can access this feature from the main menu by selecting "**Applications\Weather**".



Select "**AccuWeather.com**" to access online website, which may charge an extra fee.

### Available options:

**More information** Search for more weather information online.

**Forecast** Display 3-day weather forecast.

**Update** Refresh weather information.

**My cities** You can list all your cities, add new city, set default city, delete the selected city, etc. via "**My cities\Options**".

**Settings** Set unit, update mode and network.

## 10.4 SyncML

SyncML is short for Synchronization Markup Language. It enables the phone to synchronize your Internet data.

## 10.5 Service

Set up service of your phone.

# Tools.....

From the main menu, select the menu icon  to access Tools.

## 11.1 Alarm

Your cellphone has a built-in alarm clock with a snooze feature. You can set up to five separate alarms and choose whether or not the alarm should repeat.

- Repeat** You may select **Once** (default)/**Every day/Days** or **Customize**.
- Snooze** The alarm will repeat at regular intervals.
- Mode** You may select the mode of Ringtone: **Ring only**, **Vibration**, **Silence**, **Vibration and melody**.
- Alarm beep** You may choose one melody or FM radio as the alarm ringtone.

## 11.2 Calculator

Access this feature by selecting "**Tools\Calculator**" from the main menu.

Enter a number, select the type of operation to be performed using the navigation keys, and enter the second number, then select "=" to display the result.

Once an operation is complete, you can select the **C** key to clear numbers and carry out a new operation.

To return to the main menu, select "**Back**".

To return to the Home Screen, press the  key.

## 11.3 Calendar

Once you enter this feature from the main menu, there is a monthly-view calendar for you to keep track of important meetings, appointments, etc. Days with events entered will be marked in color.

### Available options:

- Today's Appointments** See today's appointments.
- All Appointments** See all the created appointments.
- Jump to date** Input the required date and it will be immediately highlighted.
- Go to today** Focus on today's date.
- Create** Create an appointment.
- Settings** Set the first day of the week and the first week of the year.

## 11.4 Tasks

Enables you to easily manage and track the progress of a task with priorities. All the tasks will be sorted by due date.

### Available options:

- View** View current task.
- Create** Add new task.
- Delete** Delete the current task.
- Select as done/Select as not done** Change task's status.

## 11.5 Notes

You can create a note in text format by accessing "**Tools\Notes**" from the main menu.

### Available options:

<b>New note</b>	Add new text note.
<b>Delete</b>	Delete note.
<b>Rename</b>	Rename the note.
<b>Delete all</b>	Delete all notes.
<b>Send</b>	Send note by SMS/MMS/Bluetooth®.
<b>Edit</b>	Edit the note.
<b>Select</b>	Select notes to do further options.

## 11.6 Bluetooth®

Access this feature by pressing "**Menu**" through the left softkey from the Home Screen to enter the main menu, then select "**Tools\Bluetooth**".

To use your phone with a Bluetooth® device, you need to proceed in two steps:

- Pair and register the device to your phone.
- Select this option for hands-free communication. Only one Bluetooth® audio device (your Bluetooth® headset or your Bluetooth® car kit) can be connected during the communication.

## Pair and register your Bluetooth® device

Activate the Bluetooth® feature by selecting the "**Bluetooth\Activation\On**" option. Then enter the "**Device list**" menu to search for connectable Bluetooth® devices. From the list, select the device you want to pair directly. If the Bluetooth® device has no keyboard, enter its default password to register it with your phone. If the Bluetooth® device has keyboard/keypad, enter the same set of passwords on both handset and the device to get it registered.

## 11.7 World clock

The World clock shows current local time and the time zone in different cities. You may view up to 3 cities.


## 11.8 Stopwatch

The stopwatch is a simple application for measuring time with the possibility to register several results and suspend/resume measurement.

## 11.9 Unit converter

You can use the Weight and Length converter by selecting the unit you wish to convert, then input the unit value and press "OK" to confirm.

# 12 Settings.....


From the main menu, select the menu icon  to access Settings and select the function of your choice in order to customize your cellphone.

## 12.1 Profiles

With this menu, you may personalize ringtones for different events and environments.

### 12.1.1 General

To modify the sound settings, press "**Options\Customize**" and you will see the functions below using the navigation key:

- Profile mode** You may set your phone ringtone to Ring only, Vibration only, Discreet (ring with beep), Vibration and ring, Vibration then ring, Beep and vibration, Silence (no sounds except for alarms, the icon  will be displayed).
- Ringtone** Select a melody from the list by scrolling up/down.
- Ring type** Select the type for ringtone.
- Ringtone volume** Adjust the volume by the Navigation key.
- Keypad** Select silence or the type of key beep.
- Message beep** Select a melody for a new incoming message.
- Flip tone** Select to turn on/off flip tone.



### 12.1.2 Meeting

When this is selected the phone will not ring or beep unless an alarm has been set. A new event will cause it to vibrate.

### 12.1.3 Outdoor

It is a profile designed for outdoor users who require ringtones.

### 12.1.4 Indoor

Ringtone/beep volume will be slightly lower than General mode volume.

### 12.1.5 Silence

This profile will turn off all ringtones, including notification sounds.

## 12.2 Phone settings

### 12.2.1 Clock

Allows you to modify the settings of your home city, date and time (including 12/24 hour format)

You can also set the daylight savings adjustment and activate auto update if needed.

### 12.2.2 Display

#### Wallpaper

The wallpaper is displayed when you switch on your telephone.

By selecting "**Wallpaper**" you can customize it by replacing the default picture or animation displayed on your telephone.

#### Theme

This function enables you to customize the graphic style and the colors of your telephone.

### Brightness

You may adjust the brightness of the screen by using the navigation key.

### Backlight

Allows you to reduce screen brightness for enhanced battery performance and to save power during periods of expected inactivity.

### 12.2.3 Languages

Display language for messages. The "**Automatic**" option selects the language according to the home network (if available).

### 12.2.4 HAC

Activate/Deactivate HAC as needed.

### 12.2.5 Reset web

Reset web will remove all saved data.

### 12.2.6 Headset mode

Switch audio play (incoming call, message beep, alarm beep, etc.) between **Headset only** and **Phone and headset**.

### 12.2.7 Keypad

#### Numeric keys

By customizing your keys, you can access any function directly from the Home Screen.

### 12.2.8 Clamshell

#### Clamshell open answer

This option automatically answers a call when the cellphone is opened.

#### Clamshell close options

Select between continuing or stopping applications when the cellphone is closed.

### 12.2.9 Input method <sup>(1)</sup>

In addition to the specific characters table for Cyrillic and Chinese, other data input modes are also available in your telephone. This feature allows you to write short messages and add names with special characters to your contacts.

### 12.2.10 Default browser

With this option, you can select either Browser or WEB as the default browser.

### 12.2.11 Shortcut bar

From the Shortcut bar, you can quickly access the features that you use the most. When activated, press left/right to access application shortcuts one by one, and press up/down to access a list of available actions of the selected applications. You can choose to display, hide or edit the shortcut bar (see page 14).

## 12.3 Call settings

### My numbers

Type in or modify your telephone number and confirm.

### Billing

You can access different items with this option:

#### Last call cost/ Total cost/Max cost/Reset cost/ Price per unit

- You can view the last, max or total cost of charged calls, modify it or reset it and enter the cost of a call in the currency of your choice.

#### Call timer

- You can view the total duration of last call, outgoing calls, received calls or reset duration.

#### GPRS counter

- Management of data usage volume (in kilobytes).

#### Call time reminder


- Sets reminder time.

### Call waiting

Activate/deactivate the notification of a second incoming call by a beep.

### Call forwarding

Activate, cancel or verify status of call forwarding to voicemail or to a specified number. The following configurations are possible:

- Unconditional: systematic forwarding of all your calls. The  icon is displayed.
- Conditional: if your line is busy, if you don't answer or if you are outside the network range.

## Call blocking

You can activate or deactivate the call blocking for outgoing and incoming calls. The various options are:

### Outgoing calls

The following configurations are possible:

- **All calls** All outgoing calls are blocked.
- **International calls** Outgoing international calls are blocked.
- **International except home** Outgoing international calls except those to your country of subscription are blocked.
- **All calls except SIM card** All outgoing calls except those stored in SIM card are blocked.

### Incoming calls

The following configurations are possible:

- **All calls** All incoming calls are blocked.
- **Roaming** Incoming calls are blocked when you are abroad.
- **All calls except SIM card** All incoming calls except those stored in SIM card are blocked.

### Cancel all

Deactivate all call blocking.

### Change Password

Change the original activating call blocking password.

## Caller ID

Activate/deactivate caller ID feature.

### Auto redial

You can activate or deactivate the automatic callback of your party for calls that do not get through the first time.

## 12.4 Airplane mode

Activate/Deactivate Airplane mode as needed.

## 12.5 Security settings

### Activate PIN

The SIM card protection code is requested each time the phone is powered on.

### Change PIN

Change PIN code.

### Change PIN2

A protection code for certain SIM card features (Billing/Cost/FDN, etc.) will be requested if PIN2 is activated and you attempt to access features. Select to update code with a new one (between 4 and 8 digits).

### Activate Phone Code

Once activated, this is requested each time the phone is powered.

### Fixed Call Number

Allows the phone to be "locked" so that it can only dial certain numbers, or numbers with certain prefixes. To activate this function, PIN2 code is mandatory.

### Master Clear

Clears cellphone settings (e.g. user profiles) and private data (e.g. photos, messages and recent calls etc.)

### Master Reset

Clears your preferential settings but keeps private data and independent data.

## 12.6 Networks settings

### Network selection

**Select network** • The choice of network connection is left up to the user.

**Search mode** • Network connection can be switched between "**Manual**" and "**Auto**".

### Service selection

Select communication system service.

### GPRS connection <sup>(1)</sup>

**When needed** • GPRS mode is active depending on connection requirements.

Select to get data from server.

Activate/Deactivate TTY mode.

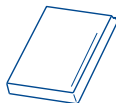

## 15 Troubleshooting.....

Before contacting the service center, you are advised to follow the instructions below:


- You are advised to fully charge (  ) the battery for optimal operation.
- Avoid storing large amounts of data in your phone as this may affect its performance.

Carry out the following checks:

### **My phone is frozen or cannot switch on**

- Check the battery contacts, remove and reinstall your battery, then turn your phone on
- Check the battery power level, charge for at least 20 minutes
- If it still does not work, please use User Data Format to reset the phone

### **My phone has not responded for several minutes**

- Restart your phone by pressing and holding the  key
- Remove the battery and re-insert it, then restart the phone

### **My phone turns off by itself**

- Check whether your phone is locked when not in use, and make sure you don't accidentally turn off your phone when locking it by pressing the power key
- Check the battery charge level

### **My phone cannot charge properly**

- Make sure you are using an Consumer Cellular 101 battery and the charger from the box
- Make sure the battery contact is clean and that the battery is inserted properly before plugging in the charger.
- Make sure that your battery is not completely discharged; if the battery power is empty for a long period of time, it may take around 20 minutes to display the battery charger indicator on the screen
- Make sure charging is carried out under normal conditions (0°C (32°F) to +40°C (104°F))
- When abroad, check that the voltage input is compatible

### **My phone cannot connect to a network or “No service” is displayed**

- Try connecting in another location
- Verify the network coverage with your operator
- Check with your operator that your SIM card is valid
- Try selecting the available network(s) manually (see page 53)
- Try connecting at a later time if the network is overloaded


### **My phone cannot connect to the Internet**

- Check that the IMEI number (press \*#06#) is the same as the one printed on your warranty card or box
- Make sure that the internet access service of your SIM card is available
- Check your phone's Internet connecting settings
- Make sure you are in a place with network coverage
- Try connecting at a later time or another location

### **Invalid SIM card**

- Make sure the SIM card has been correctly inserted (see page 6)
- Make sure the chip on your SIM card is not damaged or scratched
- Make sure the service of your SIM card is available

### **Unable to make outgoing calls**

- Make sure you have dialed a valid number and press  key
- For international calls, check the country and area codes
- Make sure your phone is connected to a network, and the network is not overloaded or unavailable
- Check your subscription status with your operator (credit, SIM card valid, etc.)
- Make sure you have not blocked outgoing calls (see page 51)
- Make sure that your phone is not in airplane mode

### **Unable to receive incoming calls**

- Make sure your phone is switched on and connected to a network (check for overloaded or unavailable network)
- Check your subscription status with your operator (credit, SIM card valid, etc.)
- Make sure you have not forwarded incoming calls (see page 50)
- Make sure that you have not blocked certain calls
- Make sure that your phone is not in airplane mode


### **The caller's name/number does not appear when a call is received**

- Check that you have subscribed to this service with your operator
- Your caller has concealed his/her name or number

### **I cannot find my contacts**

- Make sure your SIM card is not broken
- Make sure your SIM card is inserted properly
- Import all contacts stored in SIM card to phone

### **The sound quality of the call is poor**

- You can adjust the volume during a call by pressing the navigation key
- Check the network strength 
- Make sure that the receiver, connector or speaker on your phone is clean

### **I am unable to use the features described in the manual**

- Check with your operator to make sure that your subscription includes this service
- Make sure this feature does not require an Consumer Cellular 101 accessory

### **When I select a number from my contacts, the number cannot be dialed**

- Make sure that you have correctly recorded the number in your file
- Make sure that you have selected the country prefix when calling a foreign country

### **I am unable to add a contact in my contacts**

- Make sure that your SIM card contacts are not full; delete some files or save the files in the phone contacts (i.e. your professional or personal directories)

### **My callers are unable to leave messages on my voicemail**

- Contact your network operator to check service availability

### **I cannot access my voicemail**

- Make sure your operator's voicemail number is correctly entered in "My numbers"
- Try later if the network is busy

## I am unable to send and receive MMS

- Check your phone memory availability as it might be full
- Contact your network operator to check service availability and check MMS parameters (see page 21)
- Verify the server center number or your MMS profile with your operator
- The server center may be swamped, try again later

## The flickering icon is displayed on my standby screen

- You have saved too many short messages on your SIM card; delete some of them or archive them in the phone memory

## SIM card PIN locked

- Contact your network operator to obtain the PUK code (Personal Unlocking Key)

## I am unable to download new files

- Make sure there is sufficient phone memory for your download
- Select the microSD card as the location to store downloaded files
- Check your subscription status with your operator

## The phone cannot be detected by others via Bluetooth®

- Make sure that Bluetooth® is turned on and your phone is visible to other users (see page 43)
- Make sure that the two phones are within the detection range

## How to make your battery last longer

- Make sure you follow the complete charge time (minimum 3 hours)
- After a partial charge, the battery level indicator may not be exact. Wait for at least 20 minutes after removing the charger to obtain an exact indication
- Switch on the backlight upon request
- Update news and weather information on manual demand, or decrease the frequency of the auto-check feature
- Deactivate Bluetooth® when not in use

# Safety and Use.....

We recommend that you read this chapter carefully before using your cellphone. The manufacturer disclaims any liability for damage, which may result as a consequence of improper use or use contrary to the instructions contained herein.

## TRAFFIC SAFETY:

Given that studies show that using a cellphone while driving a vehicle constitutes a real risk, even when the hands-free kit is used (car kit, headset, etc.), drivers are requested to refrain from using their cellphone when the vehicle is not parked. Check the laws and regulations on the use of wireless cellphones and their accessories in the areas where you drive. Always obey them. The use of these devices may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas.

When driving, do not use your cellphone and headphones to listen to music or to the radio. Using a headphones can be dangerous and forbidden in some areas.

When switched on, your cellphone emits electromagnetic waves that can interfere with the vehicle's electronic systems such as ABS anti-lock brakes or airbags. To ensure that there is no problem:

- Do not place your cellphone on top of the dashboard or within an airbag deployment area.
- Check with your car dealer or the car manufacturer to make sure that the car's electronic devices are shielded from cellphone RF energy.

## CONDITIONS OF USE:

You are advised to switch off the cellphone from time to time to optimize its performance. Remember to abide by local authority rules of cellphone use on aircrafts.

Operational Warnings: Obey all posted signs when using mobile devices in public areas.

Follow Instructions to Avoid Interference Problems: Turn off your mobile device in any location where posted notices instruct you to do so. In an aircraft, turn off your mobile device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your mobile device offers an airplane mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about using it in flight.

(moisture, humidity, rain, infiltration of liquids, dust, sea air, etc.). The manufacturer's recommended operating temperature range is -10°C (14°F) to +55°C (131°F) (the max value depends on device, materials and housing paint/texture).

Over 55°C (131°F) the legibility of the cellphone's display may be impaired, though this is temporary and not serious.

Do not open or attempt to repair your cellphone yourself.

Do not drop, throw or try to bend your cellphone.

Do not use the cellphone if the screen, is damaged, cracked or broken to avoid any injury.

Do not paint it.

Use only batteries, battery chargers, and accessories which are recommended by TCL Communication Ltd. and its affiliates and are compatible with your cellphone model. TCL Communication Ltd. and its affiliates disclaim any liability for damage caused by the use of other chargers or batteries.
